Overall Population



Barnsley's population has been growing constantly since 2001. Since the 2011 Census, the resident population of the North area has increased by 2.3%, whereas across Barnsley there was a 4.9% increase. These increases were mainly due to more births than deaths and international migration.




Age Profile and % of Total Population



The age profile of the population is changing both locally and nationally due to the rising number of people aged 65+ years. The resident population of the North area consists of similar proportions of young people (under 19 years), those of working age and those of pensionable age when compared to Barnsley and nationally.





This is calculated based on seven domains of deprivation, which in turn are composed of a number of indicators that are scored and ranked to produce an overall domain score.


Proportion of North Lower Super Output Areas (LSOAs) in 10% Most Deprived in England

The Proportion of LSOAs in the Bottom 10% in England by Ward






Percentage of North area LSOAs in the Bottom 10% in England by Domain




Index of Multiple Deprivation 2015 North Area Council LSOAs Relative to England (DCLG, 2015)





The percentage of pupils resident in the North area achieving a good level of development increased in 2018 with outcomes now above the Barnsley average and similar to the national average.


% of Pupils Achieving the Expected Standard in the Phonics Screening Check at the End of Year 1 2015 - 2018






The percentage of pupils resident in the North area achieving the expected standard increased in 2018 however outcomes remained below both the Barnsley and national averages.

% of Key Stage 1 Pupils Achieving the Expected Standard 2016 - 2018






% of Key Stage 2 Pupils Achieving the Expected Standard in Reading, Writing and Maths Combined 2016 - 2018




Average Progress 8 Score at the End of Key Stage 4 2016 - 2018










The percentage of secondary school pupils with special educational needs and disabilities in the North area increased in 2018 and is now above the national average but remains below the Barnsley average.


Life Expectancy at Birth

Life expectancy at birth for males in the North area is 0.6 years higher than for men in Barnsley overall. The current rate of 78.7 years is higher than in 2012-2014.


Female

Rate per 1,000 Population Aged 15-17 Years




The under 18 conception rate in the North area is higher than the overall Barnsley rate. However, the current rate is the lowest during the period 2011 to 2015.




Under 75 Mortality (rate per 100,000 population)



The North area's under 75 cancer mortality rates have been lower than the Barnsley rates since 2012-2014.



Under 75 mortality rates from respiratory diseases in the North area have been higher than the Barnsley rate since 2012-2014. The current rate (46.3 per 100,000) is the highest since 2010-2012.




Under 75 mortality rates from cardiovascular diseases in the North area have been consistently lower than the rates in Barnsley overall at each time point during the period 2010-2012 to 2015-2017. However, the current rate of 86.1 per 100,000 is the highest since 2012-2014.


Excess weight

More than half of women in the North area (59.8%) breastfeed their babies at birth; which is higher than the Barnsley rate of 55.6%.




Prevalence - Adults (over 18's)

Just over one in five adults in the North area are smokers. Rates have been consistently lower than the Barnsley rates at each time point during the period 2013 to 2016. The current rate of 22.1% is the lowest since 2013.


Related Deaths per 100,000 (Over 35's)



The North area's smoking related death rates have been consistently lower than the Barnsley rates at each time point during the period 2011-2013 to 2014-2016. The current rate of 328.8 per 100,000 (over 35's) is the lowest during the period.

The 2011 Census showed that 12.8% of the residents in the North area aged 65+ lived alone and could be at risk of social isolation. Rates are similar to those levels across Barnsley and nationally.

Owned



More than 6 in every 10 properties are owned with a mortgage or owned outright in the North area. Ownership is slightly higher than the Barnsley and national rates.

Social Rented



In 2011 there were 1 in 5 social rented homes in the North area, the same as the Barnsley rate and significantly higher than nationally.

In 2011 there were 1 in 10 properties within the North area which were private rented; almost 3% fewer than the overall Barnsley rate and 7% less than national.



Total Crime (rate per 1,000 population)





There has been a continual notable reduction in the rate of Anti Social Behaviour (ASB) in Barnsley, changes in crime recording practices implemented by South Yorkshire Police in October 2016 have steadily reduced the number of ASB incidents. Offences that would have previously been recorded as ASB are now recorded as criminal offences where applicable.


The ASB rate for the North area is slightly lower than the overall rates of both Barnsley and England.

Take up of Fixed Broadband





Adults not been online within the last 3 months




Average Speed by Ward (Mbps)




Average Speed by Wards (Mbps) in North Area Council


Mortality Rate from Causes Considered Preventable (rate per 100,000 population)

Excess Winter Deaths Index




The North area's Excess Winter Deaths rate is lower than that of Barnsley and the region but slightly higher than that of England.


Road Traffic Collisions
