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Introduction and Purpose

Barnsley Council is continuing to change how we work together for a 'Better Barnsley'. We have ambitious plans to improve and grow as identified in our Corporate Plan for 2017-20. This sets out what we aim to achieve over the next three years to improve outcomes for our customers and the community as we strive to become more customer focused, modern, efficient and business minded.

We're still focused on achieving our three key priorities:

- Thriving and vibrant economy
- People achieving their potential
- Strong and resilient communities

We still feel that these areas warrant greater attention, emphasis, and possibly resources, to influence other areas of activity and make the greatest impact overall.

The council will concentrate resources to make the most impact by providing services where they are most needed and we'll help people to do more for each other and their community. To do this, we need a solid evidence base to develop effective interventions which will help to achieve a 'Better Barnsley'. Our Borough Profile provides content intended to support effective strategic and local decision making for the future. It will stimulate discussion and actions to identify commissioning needs and help us focus on improving the quality of life in Barnsley.

The data within this report are from the latest available as of May 2018. It compares Barnsley's position with the regional average and that of England where possible. In addition, local profiles have also been produced to identify priorities across the borough and support local Area Council decisions.

It is essential for Barnsley MBC to understand how and why the Barnsley population is changing. The areas covered in this document will provide an insight into the size of Barnsley's population and its make up.

Demographics

Overall Population

243,341 Up 4.9% since 2011

Barnsley's population has been growing constantly since 2001. Since the 2011 Census, the resident population has increased by 4.9%; 0.2% higher than the England rate and 1.8% higher than the regional rate. These increases were mainly due to more births than deaths and international migration inflows into the borough.




Age Profile and % of Total Population


Population Projections (2016-2030)



Using the mid-2016 population projections (and if recent trends of births, deaths and migration continue), Barnsley's resident population is predicted to reach 257,000 by 2025 and 263,500 by 2030.

Barnsley's population is ageing and the number of residents aged 65+ is projected to reach 60,800 by 2030, a change of 33% from 2016.

Barnsley's ethnic diversity continues to change. In 2011, 4 in every 100 people were from a Black and Minority Ethnic (BME) group compared to 1 in every 100 people at the 2001 census. The 2011 census is the most up to date national data on ethnicity available. Other information, such as Resident Population by Nationality and Country of Birth provides more up to date information on demographics, but not specifically by ethnicity.



Nationality can change, as some people born elsewhere who come to the United Kingdom decide to remain and apply to become British Nationals. In 2017, England had almost double the proportion of residents that were non-British compared to Barnsley.

Country of Birth


■ Barnsley ■ Yorkshire & Humber ■ England



National Insurance Number (NINO) Registrations of Overseas Nationals



The number of National Insurance Number registrations from adult overseas nationals entering the United Kingdom provides the actual number of migrants applying for registration. Data shows a downward trend following a peak in 2014/15. In 2018/19 there were 607 (52%) new arrivals from Romania and 245 (21%) from Poland, with the remaining 27% coming from other countries. However, we do not have any data to show how many of these migrants remained living in Barnsley after they received their registrations.







Index of Multiple Deprivation 2015


Barnsley Borough LSOAs Relative to England (DCLG, 2015)



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

% of Pupils Achieving a Good Level of Development 2013 - 2018



Outcomes have been steadily rising over the last five years nationally and locally with a 14.1 percentage point increase since 2014 in Barnsley against an increase of 11.1 percentage points nationally. In 2018, Barnsley improved at a greater rate than the national and regional rates, seeing an increase of 1.5 percentage points in comparison to the 0.8 percentage point increase seen nationally and 0.6 percentage points regionally.


% of Pupils Achieving the Expected Standard in the Phonics Screening Check at the End of Year 1 in 2018



The percentage of pupils achieving the expected standard increased in Barnsley in 2018 by 2.0 percentage points, twice the national and regional rates. The trend over the past five years is also a positive one with a 10 percentage point increase in comparison to the 8 percentage point increase nationally and regionally.


% of Key Stage 1 Pupils Achieving the Expected Standard 2016 - 2018



Attainment in 2018 at the expected standard has increased in each of the key stage 1 subjects compared to 2016 with the improvements in Barnsley being equal to or greater than those seen nationally and regionally in reading and mathematics.

The percentage of pupils achieving the expected standard in reading, writing and mathematics combined increased further in 2018, with the increase of 6 percentage points in comparison to 2017 being twice the increase seen nationally, and above the 4 percentage point increase seen regionally. Outcomes are now equal to national.


Average Progress Between Key Stage 1 and Key Stage 2 in 2018

Pupils in Barnsley once again made significantly more progress than pupils nationally with similar starting points in both Writing and Mathematics whilst progress in Reading was equal to national for the first time in 2018. Furthermore, progress in all three subjects was above the regional average.

There was no improvement in the Progress 8 score of Key Stage 4 pupils in 2018 with Barnsley pupils remaining significantly below national. In contrast the regional score was equal to the national average.



Average Attainment 8 Score at the End of Key Stage 4 2018



The gap between Barnsley and national widened between 2017 and 2018 and is now -2.0 points. The regional gap also widened between 2017 and 2018.

The percentage of pupils achieving a standard pass at grades 9-4 (equivalent to A*-C) increased further in 2018 resulting in the positive gap with national improving to +1.6 percentage points. Despite the 1.3 percentage point increase, Barnsley remained below the regional average.

% of 19 Year Olds who Achieved a Level 3 Qualification in 2018




In 2018 nationally and regionally, the level of attainment decreased by 0.4 and 0.5 percentage points respectively. This compares to a decrease of 0.2 percentage points in Barnsley. Despite Barnsley decreasing at a lower rate, outcomes remain below both the national and regional averages.


Key Stage 5 Average Points Score in 2018

Per A-Level Entry



The average point score for A level grades improved by 4.11 points in 2018. The increase is greater than the 0.94 points seen nationally and the 1.44 points seen regionally. The average grade increased from C- to C+, equalling both the national and regional average grades.


Per Level 3 Qualification



The average points for all level 3 Qualifications decreased by 0.3 points in 2018 for Barnsley. This decrease is greater than the -0.1 points seen nationally but less than the -0.7 points seen regionally. However, Barnsley remains below both the national and regional averages.

% of Working Age Population with:






This is the percentage of childcare settings which are not based in someone's home that have been judged good or outstanding. Barnsley was above both the national and regional averages at 31st August 2018.




Attendance




The attendance rate in Barnsley primary schools decreased from 95.5% in 2017 to 95.4% in 2018. However, the national attendance rate decreased at a greater rate during this period, resulting in the gap between Barnsley and the national average narrowing from -0.5 percentage points to -0.4 percentage. The regional gap remained at -0.3 percentage points.




The attendance rate in Barnsley secondary schools fell to 93.5% in 2018 with the decrease being much greater than the -0.1 percentage point nationally and -0.2 percentage points regionally. As a result, Barnsley remains below both the national and regional averages.

Persistent Absence



The persistent absence rate in Barnsley primary schools decreased from 10.4% in 2017 to 9.9% in 2018. This is in contrast to an increase seen both nationally and regionally. Despite this, Barnsley remains above both the national and regional averages.




The persistent absence rate in Barnsley secondary schools increased from 17.1% in 2017 to 17.6% in 2018. Barnsley remained below both the national and regional averages, although they increased at a similar rate.




Life Expectancy at Birth

Life expectancy at birth for males is currently 78.1 years compared with 74.6 years in 2001 -2003. The difference in life expectancy at birth for males born in Barnsley and those in the rest of England is 1.5 years. The gap between Barnsley and England figures for men has slightly widened when compared with 2012-14 where the difference was 1.1 years.


Female



Life expectancy at birth for females is currently 81.9 years compared with 79.6 years in 2001 -2003. The difference in life expectancy at birth for females born in Barnsley and those in the rest of England is 1.2 years. The gap between Barnsley and England figures has slightly decreased when compared with 2012-14 where the difference was 1.4 years.


Male


Rate per 1,000 Population Aged 15-17 Years





Prevalence - Adults (over 18's)




The prevalence of smoking in Barnsley has reduced since 2012, when the rate was 24.4%, but continues to be above the rate for England.





4-5 Year Olds














Under 75 Mortality (rate per 100,000 population)






Females Aged 50-70 Screened for Breast Cancer in Last 36 Months




Females Aged 25-64 Attending Cervical Screening within Target Period

Mortality Rate from Causes Considered Preventable (rate per 100,000 population)





The rates of emergency admissions for those under 18 years of age is lower than the rates for both England and Yorkshire and the Humber and is the lowest it has been in Barnsley since 2010/2011. Rates in previous years were significantly higher than the England average.

After being higher than the England rate for a number of years, Barnsley's A & E attendances are now lower than the national rate, but above the regional rate.



Percentage of Adults (19+) who do Less Than 30 Minutes of Physical Activity per Week




Day to Day Activities Limited (Disability Proxy)

Caring for Children

Children in Need (rate per 10,000 population aged under 18 years)

Barnsley's rate has historically been much lower than comparators, but increased significantly in 2014/2015 to go above those of England and Yorkshire and Humber. Since then, the rate for Barnsley has fallen for three consecutive years, whilst those for comparators have steadily increased.



Referrals to Children's Social Care (rate per 10,000 population aged under 18 years)



Barnsley's rate remains below our regional and national comparator rates. A robust and integrated 'front door' process is embedded, whereby the vast majority of referrals then proceed to 'assessment' to ensure that every child receives the appropriate course of action.

Children with a Child Protection Plan (rate per 10,000 population aged under 18 years)



After increasing significantly in 2014/15 and 2015/16, the rate for Barnsley has since returned to previous levels, falling below regional and national comparators in 2017/18. The decline in numbers is due to improved management oversight and scrutiny of cases, confident decision making and improved step-down pathways.


Rate per 10,000 Population Aged Under 18 Years



The number of our looked after children is closely monitored. There is no definitive good performance, but it is important to be confident that the right children are being looked after at the right time. There were 310 looked after children at the end of March 2018 (62.0 per 10,000), remaining below regional and national comparators.


Barnsley had the highest proportion of children leaving care adopted in 2017/18 nationally, performing well above the regional and national averages.

% Adopted in Year




Care Leavers (Aged 19-21 Years)

Performance has improved due to strong partnership working and a continued focus on the quality of support for our young people once they've left care.



Number of Social Care Users (rate per 100,000 population)




Barnsley's rate has historically been lower than both regional and national, especially in the 18-64 age band. This trend continued in 2017/2018.

Permanent Admissions to Residential Care 65+ (rate per 100,000 population)




2017/2018 saw the highest rate of admissions in Barnsley in the last 3 years, and continues to be above the regional and national rates.


% of Working Age Population in Employment

Recent trends show that the rate of people of working age and economically inactive in Barnsley has reduced. However, the rate continues to be higher than both the regional and national averages.


Average Gross Earnings




Job Density (Ratio of Total Jobs to Population Aged 16-64)








Mid-2014 Based Household Projections - Residents Living Alone


Residents Living Alone and Aged 65+ Years



















Total Crime (rate per 1,000 population)





Crime (rate per 1,000 population)







Average Speed (Mbps)










