On a whole being a Member of Youth Parliament for Barnsley Youth Council is a fantastic chance to advocate for youth voice. It has created so many opportunities for me to expand my knowledge on different political views by meeting



other MYPs and government officials at events like the annual sitting residential where I get to travel to different areas. Events like these, and the House of Commons annual sitting I had the pleasure of attending, greatly developed many of my skills for example my public speaking, networking and campaigning skills. These events set in motion projects relating to the elected issues through Make Your Mark. Recently as part of BYC's Protect the Environment campaign I have learnt new skills like correctly planting trees and creating bug hotels, as we have planted over 450 trees of various species as part of The Terrific Tree Task. Through the many aspects of being an MYP, I have also been able to work on larger projects as a region with other youth councils allowing me to be more innovative when coming up with ideas and solutions relating to our campaigns for example the zoom beyond travel pass the Sheffield City Region Youth Combined Authority pushed for and achieved.

What is the Youth Council?

The Youth Council is a group of young people who are elected by their peers to represent the views of young people living in Barnsley.

The Youth Council work closely with Barnsley Council in order to make sure young people's voices are heard in decisions that affect their lives.

This year there are three positions available in each of Barnsley's secondary schools. There are also seats available in Barnsley specialist schools and Barnsley College. Each position is for a two-year seat on the Youth Council.

Anyone in secondary year 8 or above is eligible to stand for election in school. However, anyone aged 11-19 is eligible to vote in the election.

If you live in Barnsley but do not attend school or college in Barnsley and are interested in standing or voting in the election, you may still be eligible to get involved. Please call the team to discuss this on **01226 753406**.

Barnsley also has two Members of Youth Parliament (MYPs) available to young people on the United Kingdom Youth Parliament (UKYP). Once the Youth Council is elected, members can put themselves forward to represent Barnsley on the UKYP and a vote will take place within the Youth Council to decide this. Roles and Responsibilities

The role of a Youth Councillor involves enthusiasm, time and commitment. You will be asked to attend various meetings, focus groups and sessions. You will need to be comfortable working with a wide range of people, including other young people and adults. You must have an interest in expressing other young people's ideas and viewpoints and be able to advocate on behalf of the young people who voted for you.

It is necessary for Youth Council members to take part in the following activities for the Youth Council to fulfil its role:

- Attend any necessary training
- Attend at least one full Youth Council meeting per month, this will take place at Barnsley Town Hall on a Monday 5.30pm to 8pm
- Represent the view of other young people who attend your school or college, youth group, or live in your community
- Involve young people in the Youth Council through school and college with the support of the staff team
- Feedback Youth Council issues to school or college
- ✓ Work alongside the staff team
- Attend your bi-weekly school or college drop in
- Engage and participate in your community
- ✓ Attend one campaign's committee or working group a month

Here are some skills and qualities you will need:

- ✓ Time and willingness to attend meetings
- Have good communication and listening skills
- Be able to work as part of team
- ✓ Be inclusive and don't discriminate against anyone
- Leadership skills
- ✓ Be willing to participate in sessions and meetings
- Be able to represent the views of others even if they are not your own



How can you become a Youth Councillor?

- Be willing to stand for election in the school or college that you represent
- Anyone in secondary year 8 or above is eligible to stand
- Have the approval of your parent, guardian or carer
- Have the time, availability and commitment to fulfil the role
- Be able to attend at least two of the campaign and preparation training sessions on the following dates: Wednesday 19 January 2022, Saturday 22 January 2022, Monday 24 January 2022, Thursday 27 January 2022, Saturday 29 January 2022. A time slot and location will be discussed with you once we have received your nomination
- Get your nomination permission form completed by the closing date of Friday 14 January 2022
- Take part in a supported election campaign in school or college or the community

Training and Campaign Preparation Session

Once we have received your nomination form, we will send you a letter with an allocated slot for you to attend your training and campaign preparation sessions.

Here you will receive all the information you need to undertake your role as a Youth Councillor, and you can ask any questions you have about the role. It will also give you a chance to explore skills such as communicating with others and group work. This will be a great opportunity to get to know the staff team and the other young people standing for election.

If you cannot make one of your allocated sessions for a particular reason, we will do our best to make alternative arrangements - however, this cannot be guaranteed and you must complete the training and campaign preparation before you are able to stand for election.

To undertake the role of a Youth Councillor, you need to have certain skills and abilities. We will use the above session to observe the above qualities to see if you are ready to undertake the role. You must attend the sessions in order to qualify for election.

Campaigning

To encourage young people to vote for you, it is important that you campaign in your school or college before your election date. This gives you the opportunity to explain to your peers why they should vote for you and for you to gather as much support as you can.

Part of running a successful campaign involves publicising yourself, therefore we ask you to write a short campaign speech. This should be no longer than 150 words telling people a little about yourself and giving the reasons why you would make a good Youth Councillor. We will then have your speech professionally printed onto your campaign flyers.

We realise you may need some support in writing your speech so all candidates will be offered support in the campaign preparation session to help achieve this.

It is your choice how much or little campaigning you do. If you choose to do extra campaigning without worker support, we strongly advise you to do so with a responsible adult (family friend, carer, parent, guardian or teacher) as this is at your own risk.





Please Note: Any activity which is intended to force people to vote for a certain candidate such as threats or bribery is not acceptable. Any candidate who is involved in such activity will be disqualified from the election.
