Growing Barnsley

- Our award-winning £220m investment in redeveloping our town centre has increased footfall by 31.4% since 2019.

- We helped create 153 new businesses and 2,360 jobs in 2022, supporting £86.2m in private sector investment into the borough.

There are many benefits to learning and working. Both can provide a renewed sense of purpose and belonging by sparking your interests and motivations. Having a job or learning new skills can also support good health and wellbeing, while helping you connect with others.

When James got in touch with one of the council's advisors, he told us that many of the jobs he wanted to apply for required a health and safety qualification. He said: "I was struggling to find how I could find and fund the right course. My advisor put the ball in my court. They helped me to get a funded place on the course I needed and set me up with job search support. They also suggested other learning that would go hand in hand. My advisor helped me so much. They made me feel good about the opportunities available. I had no idea this support was on offer. I wouldn't want anybody to miss out."

We have a range of options that take place in the classroom, or in hands-on workshops. By working with partners, we can connect you to available courses, training, funding and support.

Earlier this year, we celebrated the first learners that we put forward to complete forklift truck training. As part of the course, they learned to operate a forklift truck and operate safely in a work environment. All of the learners achieved a recognised qualification and developed important employability skills. Hayden, one of the learners on the course, said: "I was coming into it really nervous, thinking 'it's going to be hard' and 'I'm not going to have a clue what I'm going to be doing'. But now I'm feeling really confident.

There have been very good people here and the hands-on experience has been brilliant, exciting and motivating. I'm glad I did it and came away with the experience and qualification. I'm looking forward to a long-term, steady job."

You've got a friend in me...

Our **Independent Visitors** form a long term, consistent, and supportive relationship with a child or young person in care of the council aged eight to 21 years.

Their role is to be a friend to the young person – a trusted adult and role model who can help motivate them, develop their social skills, make sure they feel valued, and encourage them to reach their full potential.

We caught up with **Mandy Daws**, one of our **Independent Visitors**, to find out more.



I knew there was a need for more Independent Visitors in Barnsley, and I thought I could use some of the skills I acquired when I worked with young people in the NHS.

I've been paired with M for over two years and the highlight for me has been the developing relationship we have – building up our confidence with each other. We both really enjoy our time together.

I meet M once a month for usually about three hours. We do a variety of things, from shopping in Meadowhall, a trip to a farm, a meal out, or a visit to a city such as York.

We also have fun on the group activities which are arranged two to three times a year, which enables other young people and their Independent Visitors to meet and socialise together.

The Independent Visitors training I received was thorough and can be personalised to your own needs. You are given a budget for your visits and your travel expenses are paid for. You are also very well supported by the Independent Visitors Coordinator Jan.

If you have a few spare hours a month, I can recommend this role. I look forward to the time I spend with M.





The best thing about having an Independent Visitor like Mandy is that I can talk to her about anything I want, and she'll listen, although I don't feel pressured to say something about how I'm feeling all the time.

Spending time with Mandy means I'm able go out somewhere and enjoy myself. We go shopping, out to eat, go on walks, and visit the cinema.

Anyone over 21 can be an Independent Visitor and there's no upper age limit; you simply need to be able to demonstrate a commitment to making a difference and a willingness to attend mandatory training.

The scheme operates under safer recruitment practices. All volunteers will be expected to undergo an enhanced check with the Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS).

Did you know our gritters are used all year round?

Last year, we invested in a new fleet of gritters which are more environmentally friendly.







They're used year-round, and when we're not gritting, the gritter boxes are removed and the vehicles underneath are put to work. Now we're getting warmer weather, they're used full-time supporting our Highways team in a variety of work, including resurfacing roads across the borough.

We're always looking for ways to reduce our carbon emissions and help create a cleaner, greener, more sustainable Barnsley. That includes the vehicles we use and how we use them. Some of the changes include:

- Switching to electric and hybrid vehicles. We have been replacing older, less-efficient vehicles with electric and hybrid models, which produce lower emissions and use less fuel. We now have 35 electric and three hybrid vehicles.
- Optimising vehicle routes. We use local knowledge and technology to ensure we always use the most efficient route. This reduces

mileage, time spent idling, and vehicle emissions.

- 3. Encouraging sustainable travel.
- We encourage residents and employees to use sustainable travel, like walking, cycling, and public transport. We've provided bike parking, introduced cycle routes and pedestrian zones to make this easier. We even have electric bikes for employees to use instead of vehicles when travelling around our museum sites, such as Cannon Hall, Elsecar Heritage Centre and Worsbrough Mill and Country Park.
- Reducing idling. We monitor idling and encourage all our drivers to switch-off engines when stationary for extended periods, reducing fuel use and emissions.

Why we're investing in our roads

Barnsley's 750-mile highway network is our most valuable asset, estimated at more than £2.1 billion.

Maintaining our roads is one of our top priorities. This year, our core Highways Capital Programme of improvements to carriageways, footways, bridges and structures is more than £14m.

This year, councillors also approved an extra £2m to improve the borough's principal roads and side streets. Adding a variety of other projects and grant-funded schemes means more than £20m will be spent improving our highway network this year.

Matthew Bell, Head of Highways and Engineering, said: "Despite difficult times in terms of finances, we're making major investment across the borough, fixing our roads, investing in our communities, and unlocking economic opportunities.

"Extremes of weather over the last 12 months really impacted our roads over winter. The first part of 2023 saw our teams working hard to keep on top of emergency pothole repairs, with multiple teams taking on extra work, including at weekends." When we carry out pothole repairs, these are temporary and remove the immediate hazard. These, and any subsequent repairs, will continue until the road is due for a more permanent repair through our Highways Capital Programme.

Matthew added: "Our Highways Capital Programme supports our 'prevention is better than the cure' approach. It's improving road safety, reducing delay issues for the public, improving air quality, and encouraging active and sustainable travel.

"We're also making sure we're working in the most sustainable way we can, including recycling materials from highway maintenance work wherever we can."

We spoke to Pete about the move to Goldthorpe, and about his drive to help out in his local area. He told us he feels like he's "got family here at the Salvation Army, there's a caring spirit and a very closeknit community in Goldthorpe."

Something that he wanted to continue to be part of.

Pete's being volunteering for years, and has been involved with dedicating his time to help with youth clubs and church groups. He tells us that he's always volunteered alongside his work because "it's a Christian thing to do – it's the right thing to do."

But when did Pete make the decision to sell his home in Ripon and make the move to Barnsley?

Pete says that since retiring he started going to church at the Salvation Army in Ripon. He was involved in the foodbank and for five years and ran a furniture project, distributing furniture for those that needed it.

Seven years ago, they had surplus food at Ripon and were looking at where they could donate it. It was obvious in his research that Goldthorpe had an amazing foodbank and so Pete decided to donate three truckloads there.

Now, after seeing first-hand the opportunities for volunteering in the Goldthorpe area, Pete's made the big move from Ripon to Goldthorpe. He says that it was "seeing what was going on at the Salvation Army Goldthorpe that made me realise how well things were being done."

Initially, Pete started coming to Goldthorpe on a Friday to volunteer. "It was 55-mile trip each way and after recently losing my wife there was only me in a three-bed bungalow."

For Pete, the real drive for moving to Goldthorpe was "simply because of the Salvation Army, the community, and the opportunities it's given me."

Pete's currently involved with the foodbank at the Salvation Army in Goldthorpe, and also collects clothes for the clothing bank to bring with him each week. If you want to get into volunteering, Pete's advice is to "go for it." It's "great for your physical health as I keep moving."

Alison Sykes, MBE of the Salvation Army said: "Pete is very committed to his voluntary role and his consistency has made a massive difference to the army. He engages with everyone here, he has a warm smile, a listening ear and is very caring – we're proud and lucky to have him here."

She adds, "don't forget if you see Pete around Goldthorpe now he's moved here, say hello – he has some great stories to tell."

Transforming lives through volunteering



The North Area Council funds extra classes in schools, helping young people boost their confidence as they leave primary and go to high school. Ad Astra, alongside the YMCA, help children both inside and outside the classroom, but it's the changes from those who volunteer that is truly remarkable. We chatted to Sadie and V from the North Area, who've shared their stories in how Ad Astra have supported them.

Sadie's Story

"I had to leave my job due to health issues. This meant I lost confidence in myself. I didn't go out on my own. I would be what people call a shut-in. I was in a bad place. During the pandemic, Michelle from Ad Astra would come and deliver food parcels. I had heard of Ad Astra because they helped my kid at school. He always told me about the fun stuff he had done. When

Michelle said I could volunteer in the centre, things began to change."

"I didn't speak to many people at first. I started talking to another volunteer, Violeta ("V"). We found out that we had a lot in common. Now we are always together and are really good friends. We have the same sense of humour."

"Michelle and the staff have helped me to open up. I was quiet when I joined them; now I feel comfortable meeting new people."

V's story

"Ad Astra has done a lot for me to feel better about myself. I just started out making food parcels with them. It can be tough when you feel you are not coping and need to ask for help, so, when I see anybody struggling, I tell them about Ad Astra as adults can come to the women's and men's groups."

"Now, I help out during the school holidays. We get involved in the planning and running the youth club's activities. It feels good that I can give back and help the young

ones, and I have noticed a real difference in my son's confidence since he started going to Ad Astra."

"I wanted to improve my Maths so I could better support my kids' homework. Ad Astra helped me to get on a course, and I'm now working with Rachel Smallman at Roundhouse Library to help me get into work. I have good and bad days with my mental health, but I feel like I am moving forward."

It began when a dedicated group of volunteers came together with the support of the Penistone Area Team and Ward Alliance to organise the first week in March 2018, with Chrissie Yates and Barbara Lee being the driving force of the event.

The retired teachers live in the Penistone Area, Chrissie in the town and Barbara in Wortley and both are big supporters of the community and local charitable causes.

Barbara tells us that she helps to fundraise for Barnsley Hospice, supports Age UK events around Penistone, Wortley Church Friends, Stainborough Rotary Club, BIADS and Barnsley Youth Choir. She "loves being involved in the community and volunteering."

For Chrissie, "it feels good to put something back into the community and although it is hard work Penistone Arts Week really does make a difference to the town and the people."

The community arts festival was born out of a decision to widen the appeal of the literature event which had run for a few years. Chrissie says that "Willy Russell (writer of

Blood Brothers and three-time

didn't look like it would go ahead. It
was a coup to get such a big name,
so rather than cancelling the

The event has grown in the short time since it was established with activities, exhibitions and performances taking place in 20 local venues in Penistone and surrounding villages attracting over 4,500 visitors.

Barbara says, "it really brings people together; everyone is so supportive from the sponsors to the volunteers. We are thrilled that there are opportunities for young people to get involved and show their fabulous talent or encourage them to develop it."

Despite attracting big names over the years such as Joanne Harris (author of novel Chocolat, later a film starring Johnny Depp), Dire Straits' John Illsley and Ian McMillan it continues to feature and celebrate local talent and the community.

Chrissie says, "the High Street Gallery lets local artists display their artwork in the shop windows with a map of the locations. It looks beautiful. People walking around have told me how proud it makes them feel.

We are delighted to be able to give them that showcase."

Both Barbara and Chrissie are encouraging new groups and community organisations to get involved with next year's event. Since the success of the event, the pair have gone on to become members of the Penistone Ward Alliance, where they help to decide which community projects are awarded funding.

Project to support families with the rising cost of living

Recently, the South Area Team rolled out a project to support families across primary and secondary schools in the

South Area with the rising cost of living.

Stella is a Parent Support Advisor at a Wombwell school. She was delighted when approached by the team, as rolling out the project would mean they could better help those families who needed support with food, hygiene and sleep poverty. The catchment area for the school is quite diverse, and Stella tells us that she has "many parents who struggle with health issues, relationship problems, and financial issues. The work done through the community and its financial support is vital to our families on lower incomes and those who are struggling with the rising cost of living."

The South Area Team worked with Stella and the school to deliver support in a way which would best help those families who needed it.

Stella tells us that she currently works with a family of small children and a single father, who have been supported with essentials like uniforms, PE kits and food vouchers. The support the family has received has meant a smoother transition for the children starting a new school and will support the dad with his transition back to full time employment to financially support his family.

"The voucher system has been fundamental in scaffolding this family through these difficult times of adjustment and is one less pressure that they face."

From a school perspective, Stella sees the project as a fantastic way to support a community, through a school service that is backed by financial support, and which can work well to identify when and where it is needed.

Stella tells us that the school really appreciate and welcome this gracious contribution to their families through the council, and it has made a huge difference to the pupils that they support on a daily basis. "My many thanks to the South Area Team who are always at the end of a phone or an email to help support our school."
